Gospel Reading

The second coming

Jesus said to his disciples: ³⁰ The sign of the Son of Man will appear in heaven, and then all the tribes of the earth will mourn, and they will see "the Son of Man coming on the clouds of heaven" with power and great glory. ³¹And he will send out his angels with a loud trumpet call, and they will gather his elect from the four winds, from one end of heaven to the other.

³²'From the fig tree learn its lesson: as soon as its branch becomes tender and puts forth its leaves, you know that summer is near. ³³So also, when you see all these things, you know that he is near, at the very gates. ³⁴Truly I tell you, this generation will not pass away until all these things have taken place. ³⁵Heaven and earth will pass away, but my words will not pass away.'

Comments and Questions

When we read about the 'end times' people very readily ask about when it will happen, and try to discern the 'signs of the times'. Jesus warns against this sort of thing (24.26). He speaks of a troubling, disturbing

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time, of the sun being darkened and the moon not giving its light (24.29). He is saying that Daniel's vision (Daniel 7.13-14) will be fulfilled. He is telling the disciples, not so much to discern the signs, as to be ready.² He tells them to learn from the fig tree (24.32). He says plainly, 'before this generation has passed away, all these things will take place' (24.34). Jesus has disrupted time for good. He has broken into time from eternity, and the eternal dimension is here to stay. The disciples are not asked to predict anything, but are asked to be ready and prepared.

Jesus says, 'Heaven and earth will pass away, but my words will never pass away' (24.35). This gives something to guide the disciples in a turbulent world. In Matthew's time the temple has been destroyed, and Gentiles are joining the fledgling church. Jesus' teaching has challenged the understanding of groups like the Pharisees an Sadducees. So what can be relied on? The words of Jesus. Not surprisingly, this passage has been chosen for Bible Sunday, the 'Last Sunday after Trinity', and quite close to the feast day of Martin Luther, 31 October, In fact, in the Lutheran Church it is called 'Reformation Sunday'.

The danger is that the Bible comes to be used as a reference manual, or a scientific textbook, rather than as the rich blend of folk tales, history, prophecy and poetry that it is.
