Gospel Reading

Good news revealed to the simple

[Jesus said], ²⁵'I thank you, Father, Lord of heaven and earth, because you have hidden these things from the wise and the intelligent and have revealed them to infants; ²⁶yes, Father, for such was your gracious will. ²⁷All things have been handed over to me by my Father; and no one knows the Son except the Father, and no one knows the Father except the Son and anyone to whom the Son chooses to reveal him.

²⁸Come to me, all you that are weary and are carrying heavy burdens, and I will give you rest. ²⁹Take my yoke upon you, and learn from me; for I am gentle and humble in heart, and you will find rest for your souls. ³⁰For my yoke is easy, and my burden is light.'

Comments and Questions

Eight days after the feast of Corpus Christi the church celebrates the feast of the Sacred Heart of Jesus. This is really focused on the

compassion of Jesus, and also has the title of The Divine Compassion of Christ. It is often represented graphically by the image of a heart, sometimes surrounded by thorns. This, then, is not a romantic image, but conveys the suffering love of Christ.

The idea of the feast goes back many centuries, at least to the time of St Bernard of Clairvaux (1090–1153). Whereas most of the feasts of Jesus celebrate particular events, this is an 'idea' feast, that celebrates his love, loving compassion, but also loving suffering and pain. The great Franciscan saint, Bonaventure, wrote these beautiful words: 'I have found this Heart in the Eucharist when I have found there the Heart of my Sovereign, of my Friend, of my Brother, that is to say, the Heart of my friend and Redeemer. ... Come, my brothers, let us enter into this loving Heart never again to go out from It.' It was promoted especially by St Margaret Mary Alacoque (1647–1690), a French nun, who received several visions or revelations, the first on 27 December 1673.

The gospel reading for this feast begins with a prayer of Jesus to the Father. The prayer reflects a 'high Christology', reminiscent of John's gospel, and causes us to reflect on the unique and intimate relationship that the Father and Son have with each other. Jesus praises the Father because he has hidden 'these things from the learned and clever', and has revealed them instead to 'mere children'. The good news is not complicated but accessible, not exclusive but inclusive, and embraces even the lowly and humble. Those who come to Jesus in simplicity, humility and trust, will find refreshment and rest.

Jesus preached a message of hope to those who had been locked out of the benefits of society – to the slaves, those cheated of their wages, those in debt-bondage, those oppressed by others. Jesus chose to side with those who were 'mere children' – people without rights, without a voice, without power.
