The empty tomb

¹After the sabbath, as the first day of the week was dawning, Mary Magdalene and the other Mary went to see the tomb. ²And suddenly there was a great earthquake; for an angel of the Lord, descending from heaven, came and rolled back the stone and sat on it. ³His appearance was like lightning, and his clothing white as snow. ⁴For fear of him the guards shook and became like dead men. ⁵But the angel said to the women, 'Do not be afraid; I know that you are looking for Jesus who was crucified. ⁶He is not here; for he has been raised, as he said. Come, see the place where he lay. ⁷Then go quickly and tell his disciples, "He has been raised from the dead, and indeed he is going ahead of you to Galilee; there you will see him." This is my message for you.' ⁸So they left the tomb quickly with fear and great joy, and ran to tell his disciples. ⁹Suddenly Jesus met them and said, 'Greetings!' And they came to him, took hold of his feet, and worshipped him. ¹⁰Then Jesus said to them, 'Do not be afraid; go and tell my brothers to go to Galilee; there they will see me.'

Comments and Questions

Matthew used the Gospel of Mark as a source, but he presents Easter Sunday morning in a much more dramatic way. In Matthew's version it is clear that an angel has rolled the stone away from the entrance to the tomb, who in appearance is like lightning. The guards, who were posted by Pilate himself, were in a daze, and the earth shook. Jesus himself appears to the women. Significantly, in Matthew, the risen Jesus appears to Mary Magdalene and 'the other Mary'. Women are the first people to witness the resurrection. Having greeted them, Jesus gives them a task to do: to tell the other disciples that he is risen and that they will see him in Galilee. Here it is not Peter or the Beloved Disciple or any other disciples who see him first, but Mary Magdalene and the other Mary.

We know from other stories in the gospels that the male disciples of Jesus dismissed the stories of the women who said they had seen the risen Christ (Luke 24.11). Why were they so reluctant to believe? Would we have acted differently if we had been there? It can be hard to break through to a new way of thinking, that death is not the end. The women have mixed feelings 'fear and joy' – but they are impelled to share the good news. If we had been there, would we have been able to do the same?
