Gospel Reading

Jesus is baptized by John

¹³Jesus came from Galilee to John at the Jordan, to be baptized by him. ¹⁴John would have prevented him, saying, 'I need to be baptized by you, and do you come to me?' ¹⁵But Jesus answered him, 'Let it be so now; for it is proper for us in this way to fulfil all righteousness.' Then he consented. ¹⁶And when Jesus had been baptized, just as he came up from the water, suddenly the heavens were opened to him and he saw the Spirit of God descending like a dove and alighting on him. ¹⁷And a voice from heaven said, 'This is my Son, the Beloved, with whom I am well pleased.'

Comments and Questions

Epiphany continues the Christmas theme of the manifestation of God through his Son, Jesus Christ. The entire life of Christ is viewed as repeated manifestations of God, and so this feast, the Baptism of the Lord, follows on from the Epiphany, his nativity.

John is seen as an important figure, with a prophetic ministry. He shows his humility before Jesus by questioning why Jesus should come to him to be baptized (3.14). Jesus, though, wants to be baptized by John 'to fulfil all righteousness' (1.15). What does he mean by this? He is already righteous. Perhaps he wanted to show his own humility. Perhaps he was identifying with the ordinary people who were coming to John to be baptized – so, a sense of solidarity with others. Also, by doing this Jesus was in some ways authenticating the ministry of John.

The dove is an unusual symbol for the Spirit, but perhaps something more is need than 'the breath of God' (Genesis 1.2).

In Mark's version the voice from heaven speaks directly, as if this is commissioning from God. In Matthew's account, though, the voice appears to be for Jesus himself, or perhaps for the church.

Baptism is a public event, and, for Jesus, it becomes a commissioning service.
