Gospel Reading

The journey to Egypt and return to Nazareth

¹³After the wise men had left, an angel of the Lord appeared to Joseph in a dream and said, 'Get up, take the child and his mother, and flee to Egypt, and remain there until I tell you; for Herod is about to search for the child, to destroy him.' ¹⁴Then Joseph got up, took the child and his mother by night, and went to Egypt, ¹⁵and remained there until the death of Herod. This was to fulfil what had been spoken by the Lord through the prophet, 'Out of Egypt I have called my son.' ¹⁶When Herod saw that he had been tricked by the wise men, he was infuriated, and he sent and killed all the children in and around Bethlehem who were two years old or under, according to the time that he had learned from the wise men. ¹⁷Then was fulfilled what had been spoken through the prophet Jeremiah:

¹⁸'A voice was heard in Ramah, wailing and loud lamentation, Rachel weeping for her children; she refused to be consoled, because they are no more.'

¹⁹When Herod died, an angel of the Lord suddenly appeared in a dream to Joseph in Egypt and said, ²⁰Get up, take the child and his mother, and go to the land of Israel, for those who were seeking the child's life are dead.' ²¹Then

Joseph got up, took the child and his mother, and went to the land of Israel. ²²But when he heard that Archelaus was ruling over Judea in place of his father Herod, he was afraid to go there. And after being warned in a dream, he went away to the district of Galilee. ²³There he made his home in a town called Nazareth, so that what had been spoken through the prophets might be fulfilled, 'He will be called a Nazorean.'

Comments and Questions

An angel appears in a dream to Joseph again, as had happened about Mary's pregnancy. Joseph follows the instructions both times. His decision is reinforced by the quotation from Hosea 11.1: 'Out of Egypt have I called my son.'

Herod's attempt to murder the baby Jesus and his slaughter of the little children is in keeping with what is known about Herod from other sources, such as the historian Josephus. Herod was determined to get rid of any rivals to his rule as 'king of the Jews'. The model for Herod's action is supplied by Pharoah's decree to kill all the male children (Exodus 1.15-22).

'A voice is heard in Ramah', quotes Jeremiah 31.15 (other Jeremiah quotations appear in Matthew 16.14 and 27.9). The voice is Rachel, wife of Jacob, and so mother of the people of Israel. Ramah is halfway between Bethel and Jerusalem. Rachel is reported to have died on the way to Ephrath (Genesis 35.19), which is identified as Bethlehem.

On Herod's death, his kingdom was divided among his three sons: Archelaus, Herod Antipas, and Philip. Archelaus was given control over Judea, Samaria, and Idumea. His rule was characterised by cruelty and political chaos until the Romans stepped in (A.D. 6) and appointing their own governors (the most famous of which was Pontius Pilate).

Nazareth was was an agricultural village, not far from the Via Maris, the main trade route to Egypt. The word 'Nazorean' has three possible derivations: (1) from the place name Nazareth; (2) from *nazir*, as one devoted to God; (3) from *neser*, meaning 'branch' and used with

reference to the Messiah (see Isaiah 11.1). The readers were likely expected to bear in mind all three connotations.
