Gospel Reading

Jesus washes his disciples' feet

Now before the festival of the Passover, Jesus knew that his hour had come to depart from this world and go to the Father. Having loved his own who were in the world, he loved them to the end. The devil had already put it into the heart of Judas son of Simon Iscariot to betray him. And during supper ³Jesus, knowing that the Father had given all things into his hands, and that he had come from God and was going to God, 4got up from the table, took off his outer robe, and tied a towel around himself. 5Then he poured water into a basin and began to wash the disciples' feet and to wipe them with the towel that was tied around him. ⁶He came to Simon Peter, who said to him, 'Lord, are you going to wash my feet?' 7Jesus answered, 'You do not know now what I am doing, but later you will understand.' 8Peter said to him, 'You will never wash my feet.' Jesus answered, 'Unless I wash you, you have no share with me.' Simon Peter said to him, 'Lord, not my feet only but also my hands and my head!' 10 Jesus said to him, 'One who has bathed does not need to wash, except for the feet, but is entirely clean. And you are clean, though not all of you.' "For he knew who was to betray him; for this reason he said, 'Not all of you are clean.'

¹²After he had washed their feet, had put on his robe, and had returned to the table, he said to them, 'Do you know what I have done to you? ¹³You call me Teacher and Lord - and you are right, for that is what I am. ¹⁴So if I, your Lord and Teacher, have washed your feet, you also ought to wash one another's feet.

¹⁵For I have set you an example, that you also should do as I have done to you. ¹⁶Very truly, I tell you, servants are not greater than their master, nor are messengers greater than the one who sent them. ¹⁷If you know these things, you are blessed if you do them.

³⁴Now the Son of Man has been glorified, and God has been glorified in him. ³²If God has been glorified in him, God will also glorify him in himself and will glorify him at once. ³³Little children, I am with you only a little longer. You will look for me; and as I said to the Jews so now I say to you, "Where I am going, you cannot come." ³⁴I give you a new commandment, that you love one another. Just as I have loved you, you also should love one another. ³⁵By this everyone will know that you are my disciples, if you have love for one another.'

Comments and Questions

Throughout the ministry of Jesus there is mention that the hour had not yet come (cf. 2.4; 7.30; 8.20). Now, as the time of the final Passover feast approaches, Jesus announces that the time has come (13.1). There are two 'times' running through the story, the feasts of 'the Jews' and the 'hour' of Jesus. Both are determined by the design of God (2.4; 4.21, 23; 7.30; 8.20; 12.23, 27). They now join together as the feast of the Passover is also the 'hour' of Jesus. This is the moment when Jesus leaves the sphere of everyday events. To indicate both the time when this love will be shown and also the quality of his loving the expression 'to the end' is used (13.1). Jesus shows his love to the very end of his life. The design of God clashes, though, with the design of Satan, who enters into the heart of Judas Iscariot. Jesus, though carries on expressing his love, even for Judas Iscariot, as he sets about washing his disciples' feet, like a common servant. Jesus expresses his love through actions.

Simon Peter objects to Jesus' washing his feet (13.6). In this, Peter shows his lack of openness to God's revelation of God's ways in the words and actions of Jesus. Jesus asks Peter to accept the 'now' of his actions, and says that there will be a 'later' when Peter will understand. Something transformative will happen between the 'now' and the 'later' (cf. 12.16). In the foot-washing we have the theme of water again in John. Is it a veiled reference to baptism – through washing to have a 'share' with

Jesus (13.8)? Jesus carries out his act of service, although 'he knew who was to betray him' (13.11).

Judas goes out into the night, and Jesus proclaims that the hour has come for his glorification (13.31). Jesus speaks about his departure, his exodus. His glorification will be seen in his final 'lifting up' on the cross. Jesus' unconditional love is expressed by his use of the phrase 'little children' (13.33). He warns them that they will look for him but will not be able to find him as he is going out of reach of them. He gives them a new commandment: to love one another, which matches the gift of his example. He asks them to love each other 'as I have loved you' (13.34).
