## **Gospel Reading**

#### The Great Commission

<sup>16</sup>The eleven disciples went to Galilee, to the mountain to which Jesus had directed them. <sup>17</sup>When they saw him, they worshipped him; but some doubted. <sup>18</sup>And Jesus came and said to them, 'All authority in heaven and on earth has been given to me. <sup>19</sup>Go therefore and make disciples of all nations, baptizing them in the name of the Father and of the Son and of the Holy Spirit, <sup>20</sup>and teaching them to obey everything that I have commanded you. And remember, I am with you always, to the end of the age.'

### **Comments and Questions**

The 'Great Commission' comes right at the end of Matthew's Gospel. It is one of the most famous passages in the Bible. Christians through two thousand years have taken its instructions seriously as a mandate for mission. It begins with the disciples worshipping Jesus, though some doubting, presumably because they couldn't believe their eyes. Some

people are more prone to doubt than others, but at some point we have to commit ourselves, one way or the other.

The word 'all' comes up four times: Jesus has *all* authority. He sends his followers to *all* nations, to pass on *all* he has taught. And he will be with them through *all* time. There is no place outside the reach and care of Jesus. The details of carrying out the mandate may vary from time to time, but the gospel imperative to mission is always there.

There are several 'action' words in this short reading. 'Go' – Jesus sends the disciples under his authority; we can have confidence in our mission. 'Make disciples' – this is a process of teaching and learning; the word 'disciple' really means 'learner' – we never stop learning. 'Baptizing' this includes the learners in the worship and membership of the church – they aren't just learning, for they make a commitment themselves. The Trinitarian formula is inserted, perhaps shaped by its use in the early church, and then 'teaching them to obey everything that I have commanded you'. There is content in the teaching, such as the Sermon on the Mount (Matthew 5—7), and various other sections of Matthew's gospel. The Christian faith isn't about impressive traditions, or nice feelings or artistic worship, it requires commitment and obedience: learning and following the way Jesus maps out for us.

Finally, Jesus says he will be with his disciples till the end of time. How can he be with them when he is going away? Because he sends his Holy Spirit to instruct and guide them. As John puts it in his gospel, Jesus tells his disciples: 'When the Spirit of truth comes, he will guide you into all the truth; for he will not speak on his own, but will speak whatever he hears, and he will declare to you the things that are to come. He will glorify me, because he will take what is mine and declare it to you' (John 16.13-14).

#### Quotations

#### 1

Because the Christian God is not a lonely God, but rather a communion of three persons, faith leads human beings into the divine communion. One cannot, however, have a self-enclosed communion with the Triune God – a 'foursome', as it were – for the Christian God is not a private

deity. Communion with this God is at once also communion with those others who have entrusted themselves in faith to the same God. Hence one and the same act of faith places a person into a new relationship both with God and with all others who stand in communion with God.
