## **Gospel Reading**

#### The resurrection of Lazarus

<sup>32</sup>When Mary came where Jesus was and saw him, she knelt at his feet and said to him, 'Lord, if you had been here, my brother would not have died.' <sup>33When</sup> Jesus saw her weeping, and the Jews who came with her also weeping, he was greatly disturbed in spirit and deeply moved. <sup>34</sup>He said, 'Where have you laid him?' They said to him, 'Lord, come and see.' <sup>35</sup>Jesus began to weep. <sup>36</sup>So the Jews said, 'See how he loved him!' <sup>37</sup>But some of them said, 'Could not he who opened the eyes of the blind man have kept this man from dying?' <sup>38</sup>Then Jesus, again greatly disturbed, came to the tomb. It was a cave, and a stone was lying against it. <sup>39</sup>Jesus said, 'Take away the stone.' Martha, the sister of the dead man, said to him, 'Lord, already there is a stench because he has been dead for four days.' <sup>40</sup>Jesus said to her, 'Did I not tell you that if you believed, you would see the glory of God?' <sup>44</sup>So they took away the stone. And Jesus looked upwards and said,

<sup>42</sup>I knew that you always hear me,

but I have said this for the sake of the crowd standing here, so that they may believe that you sent me."

<sup>43</sup>When he had said this, he cried with a loud voice, 'Lazarus, come out!' <sup>44</sup>The dead man came out, his hands and feet bound with strips of cloth, and his face wrapped in a cloth. Jesus said to them, 'Unbind him, and let him go.'

## **Comments and Questions**

Jesus is 'greatly disturbed in spirit and deeply moved' (v.33). Another translation is, 'he was terribly upset' (CEV), indicating the depth of his feelings (the Greek word, enebrimesato, implies anger). What is he upset about? Is it the loss of friendship, the suffering of others, the struggle against evil, or something else? Why does Jesus weep when he knows that Lazarus will be raised from the dead?

The tomb was probably a hollowed-out recess in the rock, with a stone slab covering the opening (v.38).

Jesus approaches the tomb boldly, as he also approaches his own death boldly.

Jesus looks upward and prays (v.41). He does not act on his own initiative, but carries out the Father's will (cf 12.44-50).

The 'loud voice' of v.43 reminds us of 5.28-29.

The account of the miracle is very brief. It is not the details that matter but the meaning – the power over death that manifests the glory of God (v.40).
