Comments and Questions

Since the beginning of Christianity Christians have honoured the dead, especially those who died as martyrs – everyone gathered around their tombs on the anniversary of their death in commemoration. Later, these commemorations were moved into the church.

Mary's role in scripture seemed to end with Pentecost. There is no mention of her in scripture after that. However, in 431 at the third ecumenical council in Ephesus, the council declared that Christ was both God and man, refuting the teaching of Nestorius. Mary was declared to be the 'Mother of God' – *Theotokos*. Aftwewards, Pope Sixtus III (432–440) built a basilica in her honour – St Mary Major.

In apocryphal writings of the fourth century texts telling of Jesus' appearance to Mary afe rhis ascension,tell that she would soon be assumed inot heaven herself. By the end of the fifth century there was a feasat, the Dormition of Mary, that was celebrated at Gethsemane where Mary's tomb was venerated. By the end of the sixth century the feast was made obligatory in the east. The 15 August date was established around the year 650. The term *dormition* was used until 770 when the word *assumption* appeared.

There are several feasts of Mary that bring out the main truths about the simple handmaid of the Lord. The feast of the Assumption of Mary into heaven honours the fullness of blessedness that was her destiny, the glorification of her body and soul that completely conformed her to the risen Christ.

The Magnificat alludes to the Song of Hannah (1 Samuel 2.1-10), but Luke enriches the language by allusions to other sources, such as the psalms. He shows that the law and the prophets are fulfilled in Jesus. Mary has a liberating role in God's plan. Mary is understood to be great

because of the child she will bear and is praised because of her relationship to Christ.

St Augustine says: "Before conceiving the Lord in her body she had already conceived him in her soul". She had made room for the Lord in her soul and thus really became the true Temple where God made himself incarnate, where he became present on this earth.
