Appearances to the disciples

"9When it was evening on the first day of the week, and the doors of the house where the disciples had met were locked for fear of the Jews, Jesus came and stood among them and said, 'Peace be with you.' 20 After he said this, he showed them his hands and his side. Then the disciples rejoiced when they saw the Lord. 21 Jesus said to them again, 'Peace be with you. As the Father has sent me, so I send you.' 22 When he had said this, he breathed on them and said to them, 'Receive the Holy Spirit. 23 If you forgive the sins of any, they are forgiven them; if you retain the sins of any, they are retained.'

²⁴But Thomas (who was called the Twin), one of the twelve, was not with them when Jesus came. ²⁵So the other disciples told him, 'We have seen the Lord.' But he said to them, 'Unless I see the mark of the nails in his hands, and put my finger in the mark of the nails and my hand in his side, I will not believe.'

Comments and Questions

The stories about the resurrected Jesus continue with mystery, as Jesus appears in the room when the doors have been locked (John 20.19). Up to then most of the disciples had missed out on seeing the risen Jesus, but now they have an opportunity as he shows them the marks of his passion. Earlier in the same chapter Mary Magdalene has told the disciples she has seen the Lord (20.18), but it is not clear whether they believed her. Here now the other disciples say the same to Thomas, who wasn't with them when Jesus appeared. Thomas, however, refuses to believe unless he sees for himself (20.25). He wants Jesus to be 'touchable'.

Eight days later the risen Lord stands again before the disciples, and this time Thomas is with them. Jesu invites to Thomas to see for himself, and to touch his wounds (20.27). All Thomas' doubts then disappear, he responds to Jesus and says, 'My Lord and my God' (20.28). Jesus says, 'Blessed are those who have not seen and yet have believed' (20.29). It is to pass on such life-giving faith that the evangelist has written the gospel he tells us, 'so that you may come to believe that Jesus is the Messiah, the Son of God, and that through believing you may have life in his name' (20.31).
