³⁶While the eleven and their companions were talking about what they had heard, Jesus himself stood among them and said to them, 'Peace be with you.' ³⁷They were startled and terrified, and thought that they were seeing a ghost. ³⁸He said to them, 'Why are you frightened, and why do doubts arise in your hearts? ³⁹Look at my hands and my feet; see that it is I myself. Comments and Questions

This Sunday's gospel follows the appearance of the risen Jesus when he appeared to two disciples on the way to Emmaus. Having realised that their companion was Jesus, Jesus immediately disappears, and the two disciples decide to make their way back to Jerusalem to share what they have discovered. When they arrive they share their news with the other disciples. It is at this moment, that Jesus joins them, and says, 'Peace be with you' (24.36).

Jesus appears suddenly and unexpectedly and the disciples think he is a ghost. Jesus wants to show he is real and he invites the disciples to touch the marks of his wounds. They are still unsure, so he asks them to give him something to eat. They give him a piece of fish, which he eats in front of them.

The disciples are slow to understand what must happen. So Jesus sets about explaining to them. He refers to the teaching of Moses (the law), the prophets, and the Psalms (the writings), the three sections of the Hebrew scriptures, and shows them that these scriptures say that the Messiah is to die and rise again. He says that they cannot stay put, for the message about 'repentance and forgiveness' (24.7) must break out and be shared with 'all nations' (24.47). The proclamation begins from Jerusalem. They are 'witnesses of these things' (24.48).

We also sit at the eucharistic table of Jesus, and we share in the same urgent mission to tell the world about the repentance and forgiveness that we ourselves have experienced, have witnessed.
