## **Gospel Reading**

### The true vine

Jesus said to his disciples: "I am the true vine, and my Father is the vine-grower. <sup>2</sup>He removes every branch in me that bears no fruit. Every branch that bears fruit he prunes to make it bear more fruit. <sup>3</sup>You have already been cleansed by the word that I have spoken to you. <sup>4</sup>Abide in me as I abide in you. Just as the branch cannot bear fruit by itself unless it abides in the vine, neither can you unless you abide in me. <sup>5</sup>I am the vine, you are the branches. Those who abide in me and I in them bear much fruit, because apart from me you can do nothing. <sup>6</sup>Whoever does not abide in me is thrown away like a branch and withers; such branches are gathered, thrown into the fire, and burned. <sup>7</sup>If you abide in me, and my words abide in you, ask for whatever you wish, and it will be done for you. <sup>8</sup>My Father is glorified by this, that you bear much fruit and become my disciples.'

### **Comments and Questions**

Many people reading this passage take the theme of the passage to be about the vine as a metaphor for the relationship between the Father and the Son. This is expressed especially in 15.9: 'as the Father has loved

me, so I have loved you ...' But the frequent use of the verb 'abide' (*menein*) is central to the literary unity of the passage. So, Jesus develops some teaching on abiding, but he approaches it from different perspectives: the need to abide (15.1-5a), the fruits of abiding (15.5b-8), and abiding in the love of Jesus (15.9-11). This final point leads on to the command to love one another (15.12-17).

Jesus claims: 'I am the true vine' (15.1a). This statement points to what he does by means of his saving revelation. He provides the unique source of life and fruitfulness. Jesus introduces the vinedresser, the Father, who cares for the wellbeing and fruitfulness of the vine. The Father prunes the vine so that it will become more fruitful. The disciples, made clean by the word of Jesus, can be fruitful branches of the vine.

What does it mean to 'abide' in Christ? (1) Connection: abiding in Christ means to have a living connection with him. He abides in us and we abide in him (15.4). It is a very full and intimate connection. If there is no connection there is no mutual life, no fruit. (2) Dependence: Abiding in Christ implies dependence. The branch is dependent on the vine, but the vine is not dependent on the branch. The branch derives its life and power from the vine. Branches are nourished by the vine. Believers are dependent on Christ for everything that counts as spiritual life (15.4). Apart from Christ, we can do nothing (15.5). (3) Continuance: abiding also involves continuance. In fact, 'abide' (Greek, *meno*) means to remain, or stay, or continue. To abide is to reside. To abide is to continue, to stay, to remain.

What is the fruit we are to bear? It is probably both the fruit of the Spirit, which is the fruit of maturity (see Galatians 5.22-23), or a transformed character, and also fruitfulness in evangelism as we bear witness to Jesus and his work.
