³⁵When evening had come, Jesus said to his disciples, 'Let us go across to the other side.' ³⁶And leaving the crowd behind, they took him with them in the boat, just as he was. Other boats were with him. ³⁷A great gale arose, and the waves beat into the boat, so that the boat was already being swamped. ³⁸But he was in the stern, asleep on the cushion; and they woke him up and said to him, 'Teacher, do you not care that we are perishing?' ³⁹He woke up and rebuked the wind, and said to the sea, 'Peace! Be still!' Then the wind ceased, and there was a dead calm. ⁴⁰He said to them, 'Why are you afraid? Have you still no faith?' ⁴¹And they were filled with great awe and said to one another, 'Who then is this, that even the wind and the sea obey him?'

Comments and Questions

In Mark 4 we find a number of parables about the kingdom of heaven, which conclude with the narrative that is today's gospel reading. The

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kingdom of life and justice is a gift from the Lord. Having faith means welcoming that grace and living by it. However, there is a subtle way of not believing, which is to be afraid.

Lake Galilee has mountains on both sides of it. When a wind sweeps down the valley from the north-west there is no escape, and it can stir up the water violently. This can happen quite suddenly, without warning. Although the disciples were accustomed to such storms, being fishermen, they were also aware how boats could be turned over by the large waves, and the occupants drowned.

Jesus says: 'Why are you afraid? Have you still no faith?' (4.40). The corresponding passage in Matthew has 'little faith' (Matthew 5.26). Mark is more blunt, but it is the same idea in both cases – where there is faith there is no fear.

There are many things that can make us fearful, not just a storm. What makes you inclined to be fearful rather than have faith? One of the challenges of the gospel is to let go of our own securities and to be more trusting that God will look after us. Even the disciples in the boat found that hard, especially as Jesus was sleeping through the storm!
