³⁵Jesus said to the crowd, 'I am the bread of life. Whoever comes to me will never be hungry, and whoever believes in me will never be thirsty.'

⁴¹Then the Jews began to complain about him because he said, 'I am the bread that came down from heaven.' ⁴²They were saying, 'Is not this Jesus, the son of Joseph, whose father and mother we know? How can he now say, "I have come down from heaven"?' ⁴³Jesus answered them, 'Do not complain among yourselves. ⁴⁴No one can come to me unless drawn by the Father who sent me; and I will raise that person up on the last day. ⁴⁵It is written in the prophets, "And they shall all be taught by God." Everyone who has heard and learned from the Father comes to me. ⁴⁶Not that anyone has seen the Father except the one who is from God; he has seen the Father. ⁴⁷Very truly, I tell you, whoever believes has eternal life. ⁴⁸I am the bread of life. ⁴⁹Your ancestors ate the manna in the wilderness, and they died. ⁵⁰This is the bread that comes down from heaven, so that one may eat of it and not die. ⁵¹I am the living bread that came down from heaven. Comments and Questions

Jesus long discourse on the bread of life began at 6.30. By 6.41 the response of some of the crowd has become more hostile (labelled by John as 'the Jews'). Their 'murmuring' (6.43), recalling the behaviour of the Israelites in the wilderness (cf. Exodus 15.24; 16.2; 17.3), indicates rebellion. Jesus' claim to be the bread from heaven (6.35-40), is being challenged. How can he make the claim of coming from heaven, they ask, when we know his father and his mother (6.42). He is a 'local lad'. Moses had warned the murmuring people of Israel, 'Your complaints are not against us, but against the Lord' (Exodus 16.8).

Jesus says, tangentially that those who are drawn by the Father will come to him (6.45). Jesus quotes from Isaiah, 'And they shall all be taught by God' (Isaiah 54.13). He then describes himself as intermediary between God and the people (6.46). He repeats his declaration, 'I am the bread of life' (6.35, 48), and restates it, 'I am the living bread which has come down from heaven' (6.51). After saying this is the food of eternal life, he states further that, 'the bread that I shall give is my flesh, for the life of the world' (6.51).

Jesus contrasts the two breads, the Old Testament manna that the people eat and eventually all died. The Mosaic bread did not produce life and even Moses died. But there is a bread that surpasses the bread given by Moses, which Jesus identifies with himself. Jesus will give his life for the life of the world, but how would Jesus' death provide nourishment for the life of the world? It is a question that is yet to be answered.
