### **Gospel Reading**

## The healing of blind Bartimaeus

<sup>46</sup>They came to Jericho. As he and his disciples and a large crowd were leaving Jericho, Bartimaeus son of Timaeus, a blind beggar, was sitting by the roadside. <sup>47</sup>When he heard that it was Jesus of Nazareth, he began to shout out and say, 'Jesus, Son of David, have mercy on me!' <sup>48</sup>Many sternly ordered him to be quiet, but he cried out even more loudly, 'Son of David, have mercy on me!' <sup>49</sup>Jesus stood still and said, 'Call him here.' And they called the blind man, saying to him, 'Take heart; get up, he is calling you.' <sup>50</sup>So throwing off his cloak, he sprang up and came to Jesus. <sup>51</sup>Then Jesus said to him, 'What do you want me to do for you?' The blind man said to him, 'My teacher, let me see again.' <sup>52</sup>Jesus said to him, 'Go; your faith has made you well.' Immediately he regained his sight and followed him on the way.

### **Comments and Questions**

The healing of blind Bartimaeus is, on the surface, a miracle story, but it is, more profoundly a story about faith.

The journey of Jesus started in Caesarea Philippi (8.27), but there have been few details about the route until the mention of Jericho (10.46). Jericho, situated fifteen miles northeast of Jerusalem, five miles west of the river Jordan, and six miles north of the Dead Sea, is an oasis in the midst of rough terrain.

Bartimaeus is the only named person, along with Jairus (5.22), apart from Jesus and his disciples, John the Baptist, and Herod (Antipas) mentioned, until the passion narrative begins.

Bartimaeus, though blind, shows prophetic insight. The phrase he uses about Jesus, 'Son of David', references Jesus' royal lineage. He is a beggar but he asks for more than money, for he asks 'that I may see again' (10.51), and he gets more than he asks for, as Jesus says, 'your faith has saved you' (10.52). Having found faith, Bartimaeus now follows Jesus on the way.

The journey narrative has been principally concerned with showing who Jesus is and what it means to follow him. At the beginning of the journey (8.22-26) the reader is reminded how difficult it can be to see these things clearly, and at the end (10.46-52) there us clear-sighted faith in Jesus as the Son of David and agent of God's healing power and the enthusiastic response of the crowd.
