Gospel Reading

The Crucifixion

³³When they came to the place that is called The Skull, they crucified Jesus there with the criminals, one on his right and one on his left. ³⁴Then Jesus said, 'Father, forgive them; for they do not know what they are doing.' And they cast lots to divide his clothing. ³⁵And the people stood by, watching; but the leaders scoffed at him, saying, 'He saved others; let him save himself if he is the Messiah of God, his chosen one!' ³⁶The soldiers also mocked him, coming up and offering him sour wine, ³⁷and saying, 'If you are the King of the Jews, save yourself!' ³⁸There was also an inscription over him, 'This is the King of the Jews.' ³⁹One of the criminals who were hanged there kept deriding him and saying, 'Are you not the Messiah? Save yourself and us!' ⁴⁰But the other rebuked him, saying, 'Do you not fear God, since you are under the same sentence of condemnation? ⁴¹And we indeed have been condemned justly, for we are getting what we deserve for our deeds, but this man has done nothing wrong.' ⁴²Then he said, 'Jesus, remember me when you come into your kingdom.' ⁴³Jesus replied, 'Truly I tell you, today you will be with me in Paradise.'

Comments and Questions

The feast of Christ the King celebrates the glory of the ascended Christ. However, today's gospel reading focuses on the taunted and crucified Christ. Perhaps the two go together. Our reading of the crucifixion is certainly very different if we truly see Christ as king. We can see the denigrating and harsh treatment of Jesus by people who don't know who he really is. As he hangs helplessly on the cross people become emboldened to criticise, dismiss and condemn.

The reader knows that Jesus will not use his power to save himself. But what he does do is promise salvation to a criminal hanging with him. Think of the ways in which this situation is full of dramatic irony.

Jesus makes a promise but when will it be fulfilled? Jesus doesn't use the word 'kingdom' but the word 'paradise'. This is the word used in the Septuagint (the Greek version of the Old Testament) to describe the garden of Eden, the garden in which God placed Adam and Eve. As Jesus says this word Luke is showing that Jesus' death reverses the effect of the sin that was begun by the first Adam.
