³¹During the supper, when Judas had gone out, Jesus said, 'Now the Son of Man has been glorified, and God has been glorified in him. ³²If God has been glorified in him, God will also glorify him in himself and will glorify him at once. ³³Little children, I am with you only a little longer. You will look for me; and as I said to the Jews so now I say to you, "Where I am going, you cannot come." ³⁴I give you a new commandment, that you love one another. Just as I have loved you, you also should love one another. ³⁵By this everyone will know that you are my disciples, if you have love for one another.'

Comments and Questions

Jesus has just shared an intimate gesture with Judas, his betrayer (13.26). *After* this, Satan enters into Judas (13.27). It is difficult to countenance Judas sharing in the eucharistic meal, even though it shows Jesus' unending love. Judas leaves the gathering and this leads to a 'shout of triumph' by Jesus. Jesus is proclaiming that now 'the hour has come'. Jesus continues to care for his disciples, calling them 'little children'

(13.33). Jesus has already told 'the Jews', 'where I am going you cannot come' (13.33, cf. 7.34); unfortunately, the disciples share their ignorance. He gives them a 'new commandment' (13.34) that matches the gift of his example (13.15). Jesus is asking his disciples to follow him in loving self-giving. The unique quality of this love will show to everyone the connection between Jesus and his disciples (13.35).

The Cross is not simply a lovely example of sacrificial love. Throwing your life away needlessly is not admirable — it is wrong. Jesus' death was only a good example if it was more than an example, if it was something absolutely necessary to rescue us. And it was. Why did Jesus have to die in order to forgive us? There was a debt to be paid — God himself paid it. There was a penalty to be born — God himself bore it. Forgiveness is always a form of costly suffering.
