Gospel Reading

The bread from heaven

²⁵When they found him on the other side of the lake, they said to him, 'Rabbi, when did you come here?' ²⁶Jesus answered them,

'Very truly, I tell you, you are looking for me, not because you saw signs, but because you ate your fill of the loaves. ²⁷Do not work for the food that perishes, but for the food that endures for eternal life, which the Son of Man will give you. For it is on him that God the Father has set his seal.'

²⁸Then they said to him, 'What must we do to perform the works of God?' ²⁹Jesus answered them, 'This is the work of God, that you believe in him whom he has sent.' ³⁰So they said to him, 'What sign are you going to give us then, so that we may see it and believe you? What work are you performing? ³¹Our ancestors ate the manna in the wilderness; as it is written, "He gave them bread from heaven to eat."' ³²Then Jesus said to them,

'Very truly, I tell you, it was not Moses who gave you the bread from heaven, but it is my Father who gives you the true bread from heaven.

33For the bread of God is that which comes down from heaven and gives life to the world.'

³⁴They said to him, 'Sir, give us this bread always.' ³⁵Jesus said to them,

'I am the bread of life. Whoever comes to me will never be hungry, and whoever believes in me will never be thirsty.'

Comments and Questions

Today's gospel reading is the first section of a long discourse by Jesus on the Bread of Heaven. The introductory question, 'Rabbi, when did you come here?' prompts Jesus to speak about the need to search for food that endures to eternal life.

People ask for signs from him (6.30), to assess his miracle-working credentials to see whether he surpasses those of Moses. Jesus corrects them, saying it was not Moses but his heavenly Father who gives 'the true bread from heaven' (6.32). This is the bread that gives life to the world (6.33).

Then the people want this bread for themselves (bearing in mind the miracle of the loaves and the fish from 6.5-15). Jesus points to himself as the 'true bread from heaven' (6.35).

Harvest is something always to be thankful for, but it is also a metaphor for the spiritual food that nourishes us invisibly. How much do we value this spiritual nourishment?
